Amir Zaki's photographs are constructs derived from a zealous and independent vision. Zaki conceives his images not as precise documents to delineate space and time, but as hybridized moments that stem from a suspended reality. These images document the strange dysphoria associated with memory, how it shifts and mutates according to a highly personalized and unknowable private landscape. Zaki prefigures a divine reality where verticality replaces the traditional horizontal perception.
