

AAA Bibliography Style Format

The citation format you should use is the American Anthropological Association format. Full details are in the AAA style guide at http://www.aaanet.org/pubs/style_guide.htm . You can look at a journal published by the AAA (e.g. *American Anthropologist*) for examples.

Here are some examples:

article:

chapter in a book:

Wilson, M.

1981. Xhosa Marriage in Historical Perspective. In *essays on African Marriage in Southern Africa*. Krige, E. and Comaroff, J. L., eds. Pp. 33-45. Cape Town: Juta & Co..

dissertation:

Setel, P. W.

1994. *Bo'n town life: Youth, AIDS, and the changing character of adulthood in Kilimanjaro, Tanzania*. Ph.D. dissertation, Boston University.

on-line source:

Rheingold, Howard

2000 A Slice of Life in My Virtual Community. Electronic document, <http://well.sf.ca.us/serv/ftp.htm>, accessed July 5, 2000.

If a web site doesn't have a date the document was posted, you can use n.d. (no date) for the date, but indicate when you accessed it.

Citations in the text take the form (author date: pages) e.g. Appadurai writes that "globalization is an illusion" (Appadurai 1996: 12). If you're not quoting a specific page you can use (author date) e.g. Anthropologists have challenged conventional understandings of globalization (Appadurai 1996, Hannerz 2002).
